Update on Search For New Rector by Carol Dockter

Last February the Vestry appointed Tim Ash, Erin Bennett, Priscilla Burrows, Tim Holsonback, Wendy Kulp, M.J. Mahland, Fred Orman, Mindy Saunders, Rosemary Snapp, and Jeff Speer to a Search Committee for a new Rector. Bill Brunell and Carol Dockter represented the Vestry. Rosemary Snapp served as our spiritual advisor and reminded us of keeping the Holy Spirit present in our endeavors. Tim Holsonback quickly volunteered to be the clerk and, as it evolved, Carol Dockter, Tim Ash and Tim Holsonback became a leadership team.

The first step on our path was the Day of Discovery on March 11th. Over 40 people participated to discover "who we are today" and our "hopes and dreams" for the future. The Rev. Megan Traquair, Canon for the Ordinary, was the facilitator and Landmark Café catered the food through the generosity of Lyle and Sivey Anderson. The second step was for the committee to analyze and summarize the information gleaned from the Day of Discovery. This took several meetings to accomplish and when completed the committee thought they had a fairly good picture of St. Stephen's parish. This is the foundation for the three documents that were written.

The first document completed (the third step) was the Parish Portfolio. The portfolio includes questions about the parish and a compensation package. The committee drafted the document and the Vestry edited and approved it for posting on the national church's website, which is where potential applicants search for employment. Also, the committee found out that applicants answer the same questions in the interviews. A match of a priest to a parish by the Diocese can occur throughout this process. The next two documents (the fourth and fifth steps) are for our official use.

Search

The Parish Profile is on our website and contains information about our parish, the community, and our hopes and dreams for the future. The Tri-fold is an invitation for interested persons to apply for Rector. Both documents are also posted on St. Stephen's website. They are under "St. Stephen's in Transition." The closing date for receiving applications was Friday, July 13th. At this writing we are waiting to hear from Rev. Megan when we will be receiving resumes and begin the first interviews. Hopefully by the time you read this, the Search Committee will be fully involved in this step and able to recommend a candidate to the Vestry.

The last step will be at the Vestry level. This will include the second set of interviews and, if it is determined there is a good match, an invitation to serve. Please continue with your fervent prayers that someone will soon answer the call to serve St. Stephen's.


San Carlos Apache Blanket Drive 2018

The weekend before Thanksgiving and Christmas is when All Saints Episcopal Church, Safford, AZ delivers food boxes to the residents of the Bylas, AZ area of the San Carlos Apache Reservation. They have been doing this for over 15 years. Our parish has supported the Safford church for most of that time. At first, we took specified grocery items and helped pack and deliver them. Our Outreach ministry also sent them money to assist in buying the bulk items for several years. About 6 or 7 years ago, we began collecting used clean blankets to add to the food box delivery. The area is all flat and the winter is colder there than we experience. The money for the food boxes is very scarce this year and we may only be delivering blankets before the holidays. The Diocese previously granted money through the Jubilee program but Safford's share has run out and the coordinator for this project at All Saints is not sure there will be any substantial funds to help in 2018. However, St. Stephen's can still help by supplying the good condition, used blankets and sleeping bags. The clear zip style plastic bags that blankets come back from cleaners in are a useful item for keeping the stored items clean until delivery. We do have several folks who donate handmade hats, scarves and afghans which are most welcome. However, we do not accept clothing as it is not practical for deciding which family gets which sizes, etc. All donations may be left on a side pew and will be transferred to storage until delivery time. Church as a School of Love

Beautiful banners in our church proclaim: WE ARE LOVE---CALLED TO SERVE. Now as we are involved in a search process meditating on their message leads to questions of, "How do we love and serve"? "How does this congregation, as we say in our mission statement, 'share God's love through service to others'. How do we model the love that Paul envisioned in his letters? How as he exhorts in Romans, "show family affection to one another in brotherly and sisterly love"? He and the early Christians, inspired by the "kingdom" Jesus brought, worked to live into radical new communities based on unity and compassion, where Jews and Gentiles, masters and slaves, men and women, old and young did that. And it changed the world!

We see many outward, visible examples of how we serve. But how do we see/show love, unity, compassion, in community? How does a congregation of flawed and fractious people become a school of love? How do people know "we are Christians by our love" at St. Stephen's?

Douglas Steere, an eminent Quaker, helped create loving communities when he took as his ministry Martin Buber's statement "The greatest thing one can do for another is confirm what is deepest in another." How do we practice that with one another? He told how Jesus did it in the Zacchaeus story in the Gospel of Luke. Jesus modeled four facets of confirmation: attention, acceptance, association and affirmation and showed the art of loving not only to those who reciprocate love but also how to love those whom many despise, scorn, ostracize. Zacchaeus was a tax collector, an oppressor getting rich, not popular; but he wanted to see Jesus in Jericho. A short man he climbed a tree to see over the heads of the crowd.

"When Jesus came to that place" says Luke, "he stopped and looked up." He gave Zacchaeus attention. Then to attention Jesus added acceptance. "Zacchaeus, hurry down for I have to stay at your house today." In seconds Jesus had confirmed him with attention and acceptance and to these he added association. Zacchaeus scrambled down and received him rejoicing.

To attention and acceptance certified in association, Jesus added a fourth incalculable element in confirmation- affirmation. No sooner had he gotten Jesus to the house than Zach felt compelled to justify himself, putting his best face forward, promising to give to the poor and repaying fourfold. Not as a consequence of any worthiness in this tax collector, but on the basis of God's infinite mercy and love Jesus declared "Today salvation has come to this house, for he too is a, child of Abraham." Zacchaeus was started on that inward path of transformation, learning to live by love—learning to be a person in community with other persons.

As schools of love, churches can create a culture of confirming what is deepest in others by attention, acceptance, association and affirmation. This is the creative, difficult and transforming work to which we as Christians are called----to be builders of liberating communities that free love in us and free love in others. Want to try it?
