

THE FEAST OF POLYCARP OF SMYRNA

BISHOP AND MARTYR, 156

1

Wed 23 February 9:30am, 2022



Polycarp (/'pplika:rp/; Greek: Πολύκαρπος, *Polýkarpos*; Latin: *Polycarpus*; AD 69 – 155) was a Christian <u>bishop</u> of <u>Smyrna</u>.^[11] According to the <u>Martyrdom of Polycarp</u>, he died a martyr, bound and burned at the stake, then stabbed when the fire failed to consume his body.^[2] Polycarp is regarded as a <u>saint</u> and <u>Church Father</u> in the <u>Catholic</u>, <u>Eastern Orthodox</u>, <u>Oriental Orthodox</u>, <u>Anglican</u>, and <u>Lutheran</u> churches.

Both <u>Irenaeus^[3]</u> and <u>Tertullian^[4]</u> say that Polycarp had been a disciple of John the Apostle, one of Jesus' disciples. In <u>On Illustrious Men</u>, <u>Jerome</u> writes that Polycarp was a disciple of John the Apostle and that John had ordained him as a bishop of Smyrna.^[5] Polycarp is regarded as one of three chief <u>Apostolic Fathers</u>, along with <u>Clement of Rome</u> and <u>Ignatius of</u> <u>Antioch</u>.

<u>Surviving writings and early ac-</u> <u>counts</u>

The sole surviving work attributed to him is the *Epistle of Polycarp to the Philippians*, a

Do not fear what you are about to suffer. Beware, the devil is about to throw some of you into prison so that you may be tested, and for ten days you will have affliction. Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life. Let anyone who has an ear listen to what the Spirit is saying to the churches. Whoever conquers will not be harmed by the second death."

Are you able to drink the cup that I am about to drink?" They said to him, "We are able." He said to them, "You will indeed drink my cup, but to sit at my right hand and at my left, this is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared by my Father."

Homily

Nicene Creed: *Traditional Version* (Said aloud by all, in unison)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth,

of all that is, seen and unseen.

- We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made.

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

mosaic of references to the <u>Greek Scriptures</u>, which, along with an account of <u>The Martyrdom</u> <u>of Polycarp</u>, forms part of the collection of writings called <u>Apostolic Fathers</u>. After <u>the Acts</u> <u>of the Apostles</u>, which describes the death of <u>Stephen</u>, the <u>Martyrdom</u> is considered one of the earliest genuine accounts of a <u>Christian martyrdom</u>.^[1] Charles E. Hill argues extensively that the teachings Irenaeus ascribes to a certain apostolic "presbyter" throughout his writings represent lost teachings of Polycarp, his teacher.^[6]

<u>Life</u>

The chief sources of information concerning the life of Polycarp are *The Martyrdom of Polycarp*, <u>Adversus Haereses</u>, *The Epistle to Florinus*, the <u>epistles of Ignatius</u>, and Polycarp's own <u>letter to the Philippians</u>. In 1999, the Harris Fragments, a collection of 3rd- to 6th-century <u>Coptic</u> texts that mention Polycarp, were published.^[7]

Link to the Apostles and Jesus

According to Irenaeus, Polycarp was a companion of <u>Papias</u>, another "hearer of John", and a correspondent of <u>Ignatius of Antioch</u>. Ignatius addressed a letter to him and mentions him in his <u>letters to the Ephesians</u> and to the <u>Magnesians</u>.^[8] Polycarp's own <u>Epistle of Polycarp to the Philippians</u> gives us some insights to the early usage of the <u>New Testament</u> from the quotes used within his letter.^[9]

Irenaeus regarded the memory of Polycarp as a link to the apostolic past. In his letter to Florinus, a fellow student of Polycarp who had become a Roman presbyter and later lapsed into heresy, Irenaeus relates how and when he <u>became a Christian</u>:^[10]

I could tell you the place where the blessed Polycarp sat to preach the <u>Word of God</u>. It is yet present to my mind with what gravity he everywhere came in and went out; what was the sanctity of his deportment, the majesty of his countenance; and what were his holy exhortations to the people. I seem to hear him now relate how he conversed with John and many others who had seen Jesus Christ, the words he had heard from their mouths.^[11]


In particular, he heard the account of Polycarp's discussion with John and with others who had seen <u>Jesus</u>. Irenaeus reports that Polycarp was converted to Christianity by apostles, was consecrated a presbyter, and communicated with many who had seen Jesus. He writes that he had had the good fortune, when young, to know Polycarp, who was then far advanced in years.^[12]

<u>Visit to Anicetus</u>

According to Irenaeus, during the time his fellow Syrian <u>Anicetus</u> was <u>Bishop of Rome</u>, Polycarp visited <u>Rome</u> to discuss differences in the practices of the churches of <u>Asia</u> and Rome. Irenaeus states that on certain things the two speedily came to an understanding, while as to the observance of <u>Easter</u>, each adhered to his own custom, without breaking off <u>full communion</u> with the other.^[13] Polycarp followed the Eastern practice of celebrating the feast on the <u>14th of Nisan</u>, the day of the Jewish <u>Passover</u>, regardless of the day of the week on which it fell, while Anicetus followed the Western practice of celebrating the feast on the first <u>Sunday</u> following the first <u>full moon</u> after the <u>spring equinox</u>. Anicetus allowed Polycarp to celebrate the <u>Eucharist</u> in his own church, which was regarded by the Romans as a great honor.^[13] Notice: All church activities may be internet streamed, video recorded, and photographed for church uses.
