

Eastern Christianity

For Eastern Orthodox and some Eastern Catholic Christians this feast also marks the end of the Apostles' Fast (which began on the Monday following All Saints' Sunday, i.e., the second Monday after Pentecost).^[3] While not considered among the twelve great feasts, it is one of five additional feasts ranked as a great feast in the Eastern Orthodox tradition and is often celebrated with an all-night vigil starting the evening before.^[4] In the Julian calendar, 29 June falls on the <u>Gregorian calendar</u> date of 12 July from 1900–2099, inclusive.

In the Russian Orthodox tradition, <u>Macarius</u> of <u>Unzha</u>'s <u>Miracle of the Moose</u> is said to have occurred during the Apostles' Fast and the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul that followed it.^[5]

The First Lesson - A Reading from Ezekiel 34:11-16

Thus says the Lord God: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

Gospel Lesson:

Deacon: The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to John 21:15-19

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." A second time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." He said to him the third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go." Sermon

Invitation to Communion:

Presider: These are the gifts of God for the People of God.

People: Christ invites us all to be known and fed here.

Everyone is welcome and invited to come forward and receive the bread and wine in this church. Our bread is gluten/nut free. It is real wine. Please kneel or stand at the altar rail, and extend your hand to receive the bread. Because of ongoing Covid concerns we are intincting/dipping the bread only. No drinking from the chalice/cup. When the chalice comes to you, dip the bread in the wine, and consume it. If you prefer, you can eat the bread without the wine. You may receive a blessing instead of the bread and wine also; indicate your desire to have a blessing by crossing your arms over your chest.

In the <u>Coptic Orthodox Church</u> and the <u>Ethiopian Orthodox Tewahedo Church</u>, the feast of saints Peter and Paul is also celebrated on the day 5 <u>Epip</u> which is also the end of the fast of the apostles in these traditions.^[6]

Spiritual Christian tradition

Although the Canadian <u>Doukhobors</u>, a <u>Spiritual Christian</u> denomination, do not <u>venerate</u> <u>saints</u>, the Feast of St. Peter and St. Paul has traditionally been a day of celebration for them. Since 1895, it has acquired a new significance as a commemoration of the "Burning of the Arms", the Doukhobors' destruction of their weapons, as a symbol of their refusal to participate in government-sponsored killing.^[7] It is celebrated now by their descendants as simply "Peter's Day" (Russian: *Petro den.*), sometimes referred to as the "Doukhobor Peace Day".^{[8][9]}

Western Christian tradition

In the <u>General Roman Calendar</u>, the celebration is a <u>solemnity</u>. In earlier editions, it was <u>ranked</u> as a Double (<u>Tridentine Calendar</u>), Double of the First Class (e.g., <u>General Roman Calendar of 1954</u>), or First-Class Feast (<u>General Roman Calendar of 1960</u>). Prior to the <u>litur-gical reforms of Pope Pius XII</u>, this feast was followed by a common <u>octave</u>. On this feast, newly created <u>metropolitan archbishops</u> receive from the <u>pope</u> the primary symbol of their office, the <u>pallium</u>.^[10]

It is a <u>holy day of obligation</u> in the <u>Latin Church</u>, although individual conferences of bishops can suppress the obligation.^[11] In England, Scotland and Wales the feast is observed as a holy day of obligation while in the United States and Canada, it is not. The Feast ceased being a Holy Day of Obligation in the United States in 1840.^[12]

The <u>Church of England</u> celebrates the Feast of St Peter and St Paul on 29 June as a <u>festival</u>.^[13] The <u>Lutheran churches</u> celebrate 29 June as the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul; it holds the rank of a <u>lesser festival</u>.^[14]

The <u>Voice of the Martyrs</u>, a <u>non-governmental organization</u> that aids <u>persecuted Christians</u>, has designated 29 June as the "Day of the Christian Martyr", in honour of the martyrdom of Saints Peter and Paul, as well as all <u>martyrs for the Christian faith</u>.^[15]

Because of the importance of saints Peter and Paul to the Catholic Church, many Catholicmajority countries also observe their feast day as a public holiday. The feast is observed in <u>Rome</u> because St. Paul and St. Peter are <u>patron saints</u> of the Eternal City.^[16] In the <u>Apulia</u> region of southeastern Italy, the feast of saints Peter and Paul was associated with the <u>Tarantella</u> dance since the middle ages. It was believed that the bite of the <u>tarantula wolf spider</u> caused of form of <u>manic behavior</u> which would result in death if the afflicted did not dance and could not be cured without the intercession of saint Paul. These panics were especially common near the feast day in the 16th and 17th centuries in <u>Galatina</u>, where the basilica of Saint Peter and Paul is located.^[17]

In <u>Malta</u> the solemnity is a public holiday and in <u>Maltese</u> is known as *L-Imnarja*. It is celebrated with festivals the preceding weekend in <u>Buskett Gardens</u> in <u>Rabat</u>.^[18]

It is also a public holiday of the <u>Canton of Ticino</u>, Switzerland, as well as parts of the Swiss cantons of <u>Lucerne</u> and <u>Graubünden</u>.^[19] It is a public holiday in Peru^[citation] <u>needed</u> and in various municipalities of the Philippines.^[citation needed] In <u>Or</u>- Continued online Notice: All church activities may be internet streamed, video recorded, and photographed for church uses.
