**Bartholomew** (was one of the twelve apostles of Jesus according to the New Testament. He is said to have been martyred for having converted Polymius, King of Armenia, to Christianity. He has also been identified as *Nathanael* or *Nathaniel*,<sup>[1]</sup> who appears in the Gospel of John when introduced to Jesus by Philip (who also became an apostle; John 1:43–51), although some modern commentators reject the identification of Nathanael with Bartholomew.<sup>[2]</sup> According to the Synaxarium of the Coptic Orthodox Church of Alexandria, Bartholomew's martyrdom is commemorated on the first day of the Coptic calendar (i.e., the first day of the month of Thout), which currently falls on 11 September (corresponding to 29 August in the Julian calendar). ### The Second Lesson - A Reading from 1 Corinthians 4:9-15

I think that God has exhibited us apostles as last of all, as though sentenced to death, because we have become a spectacle to the world, to angels and to mortals. We are fools for the sake of Christ, but you are wise in Christ. We are weak, but you are strong. You are held in honor, but we in disrepute. To the present hour we are hungry and thirsty, we are poorly clothed and beaten and homeless, and we grow weary from the work of our own hands. When reviled, we bless; when persecuted, we endure; when slandered, we speak kindly. We have become like the rubbish of the world, the dregs of all things, to this very day.

I am not writing this to make you ashamed, but to admonish you as my beloved children. For though you might have ten thousand guardians in Christ, you do not have many fathers. Indeed, in Christ Jesus I became your father through the gospel.

## Nicene Creed (Traditional)

Bartholomew the Apostle is <u>remembered</u> in the <u>Church of England</u> with a <u>Festival</u> on <u>24 August</u>. [3][4]

The Armenian Apostolic Church honours Saint Bartholomew along with <u>Saint Thaddeus</u> as its patron saints. *Bartholomew* is English for *Bar Talmai* (Greek: Βαρθολομαῖος, transliterated *Bartholomaios* in Greek) comes from the <u>Aramaic</u>: *Japar-Tolmay* native to Hebrew "son of <u>Talmai</u>", or farmer, "son of the furrows".<sup>[5]</sup> Bartholomew is listed among the Twelve Apostles of Jesus in the three synoptic gospels: Matthew, <sup>[10:1-4]</sup> Mark, <sup>[3:13–19]</sup> and <u>Luke</u>, <sup>[6:12–16]</sup> and also appears as one of the witnesses of the <u>Ascension</u>; <sup>[Acts 1:4, 12, 13]</sup> on each occasion, however, he is named in the company of Philip. He is not mentioned by the name "Bartholomew" in the Gospel of John, nor are there any early <u>acta</u>, <sup>[a]</sup> the earliest being written by a <u>pseudepi-graphical</u> writer, <u>Pseudo-Abdias</u>, who assumed the identity of <u>Abdias of Babylon</u> and to whom is attributed the Saint-Thierry (*Reims*, Bibl. mun., ms 142) and Pseudo-Abdias manuscripts.<sup>[6][7]</sup>

In art Bartholomew is most commonly depicted with a beard and curly hair at the time of his martyrdom. According to legends, he was skinned alive and beheaded so is often depicted holding his <u>flayed</u> skin or the curved flensing knife with which he was skinned; thus, he is remembered and approved as saint of leather makers.<sup>[8]</sup>

### New Testament references

In the East, where Bartholomew's evangelical labours were expended, he was identified as "Nathanael", in works by <u>Abdisho bar Berika</u> (often known as "Ebedjesu" in the West), the 14th century Nestorian metropolitan of <u>Soba</u>, and Elias, the bishop of Damascus.<sup>[b]</sup> Nathanael is mentioned only in the Gospel of John. In the Synoptic Gospels, Philip and Bartholomew are always mentioned together, while Nathanael is never mentioned. In John's gospel, however, Philip and Nathanael are similarly mentioned together. <u>Giuseppe Simone Assemani</u> specifically remarks, "the Chaldeans confound Bartholomew with Nathaniel".<sup>[C]</sup> Some Biblical scholars reject this identification, however.

### <u>Tradition</u>

<u>Eusebius of Caesarea's Ecclesiastical History</u> (5:10) states that after the Ascension, Bartholomew went on a <u>missionary</u> tour to India, where he left behind a copy of the <u>Gospel of Mat-</u> <u>thew</u>. Other traditions record him as serving as a missionary in Ethiopia, <u>Mesopotamia</u>, <u>Par-</u> <u>thia</u>, and <u>Lycaonia</u>.<sup>[10]</sup> Popular traditions and legends say that Bartholomew preached the Gospel in India, then went to Greater Armenia.<sup>[5]</sup>

### <u>Mission to India</u>

Two ancient testimonies exist about the mission of Saint Bartholomew in India. These are of <u>Eusebius</u> of Caesarea (early 4th century) and of <u>Saint Jerome</u> (late 4th century). Both of these refer to this tradition while speaking of the reported visit of <u>Pantaenus</u> to India in the 2nd century.<sup>[11]</sup> The studies of Fr A.C. Perumalil SJ and Moraes hold that the Bombay region on the <u>Konkan</u> coast, a region which may have been known as the ancient city <u>Kalyan</u>, was the field of Saint Bartholomew's missionary activities. Previously the consensus among scholars was against the apostolate of Saint Bartholomew the Apostle in India. The majority of the scholars are skeptical about the mission of Saint Bartholomew the Apostle in India. Stallings (1703), Neander (1853), Hunter (1886), Rae (1892), Zaleski (1915) are the authors who supported the Apostolate of Saint Bartholomew in India. Scholars such as Sollerius

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
