The Sermon

Nicene Creed (Traditional)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

Then the Celebrant continues:

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said,

"Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues:

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN.**

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Richard Rolle (c. 1300 – 30 September 1349)^{[1][2]} was an English hermit, mystic, and religious writer.^[3] He is also known as Richard Rolle of Hampole or de Hampole. since at the end of his life he lived near a Cistercian nun-<u>nery</u> in <u>Hampole</u>, now in <u>South Yorkshire</u>.^{[4][5]} In the words of Nicholas Watson. scholarly research has shown that "[d]uring the fifteenth century he was one of the most widely read of English writers, whose works survive in nearly four hundred English ... and at least seventy Continental manuscripts, almost all written between 1390 and 1500."6

<u>Life</u>

In his works, Rolle provides little explicit evidence about his early life and education. Most, if not all, of our information about him comes from the Office of Lessons and Antiphons that was composed in the 1380s in preparation for his canonisation, although this never came about.^{[7][8]} Born into a small farming family^[9] and brought up at Thornton-le-Dale^[10] near Pickering, he studied at the University of Oxford where he was sponsored by Thomas de Neville, the Archdeacon of Durham.^[11] While there, he is said to have been more interWalter Hilton Can.Reg. (c. 1340/1345 – 24 March 1396) ^[1] was an English <u>Augustinian</u> <u>mystic</u>, whose works gained influence in 15th-century England and Wales. He has been <u>canonized</u> by the <u>Church of</u> <u>England</u> and by the Episcopal Church in the United States.

<u>Life</u>

Walter Hilton was born about 1340–1345. Writing centuries later, an early 16th-century Carthusian, James Grenehalgh of Lancashire, referred to Hilton as a mystic coming "from the same region".^[2] There is presumptive evidence that Hilton attended the University of Cambridge, some time between about 1360 and 1382.^[2] Walter de Hilton, Bachelor of Civil Law, clerk of Lincoln Diocese, was granted the reservation of a canonry and prebend of Abergwili, Carmarthen, in January 1371. ^[2] In January 1371 Hilton was a bachelor of law attached to the diocesan court of Ely.^[2] Some manuscripts describe Hilton as a *commensor* or *inceptor decretorum*, i.e. one who had completed the studies and examinations for a mastership of canon law, but had not undertaken the regency that would give him the title. In the early 1380s, Hilton turned away from the world and became a solitary, as he

Margery Kempe (c. 1373 – after 1438) was an English Christian mystic, known for writing through dictation The Book of Margery Kempe, a work considered by some to be the first autobiography in the English language. Her book chronicles Kempe's domestic tribulations, her extensive pilgrimages to holy sites in Europe and the Holy Land, as well as her mystical conversations with God. She is honoured in the Anglican Communion, but has not been canonised as a Catholic saint.

<u>Early life and family</u>

She was born Margery Burnham or Brunham around 1373 in Bishop's Lynn (now King's Lynn), Norfolk, England. Her father, John Brunham, was a merchant in Lynn, mayor of the town and Member of Parliament. The first record of her Brunham family is a mention of her grandfather, Ralph de Brunham, in 1320 in the Red Register of Lynn. By 1340 he had ioined the Parliament of Lynn.^[1] Kempe's kinsman Robert Brunham, possibly her brother, became a Member of Parliament for Lvnn in 1402 and $1417.^{[2]}$

<u>Life</u>

No records remain of any formal education that Kempe may have received. As an
