Saint Brigid of Kildare or Brigid of Ireland (Irish: Naomh Brid; Classical Gaelic: Brighid; Latin: Brigida; c. 451 - 525) is the patroness saint (or 'mother saint') of Ireland, and one of its three national saints along with Patrick and Columba. According to medieval Irish hagiographies, she was an abbess who founded the important abbey of Kildare (Cill Dara), [4] as well as several other convents of nuns. There are few historical facts about her, and her hagiographies are mainly anecdotes and miracle tales, some of which are rooted in pagan folklore.[3] They say Brigid was the daughter of a chieftain and a slave woman, and was raised in a druid's household before becoming a consecrated virgin. She is patroness of many things, including poetry, learning, healing, protection, blacksmithing, livestock and dairy production. In her

honour, a perpetual fire was kept burning at Kildare for centuries.

Some historians suggest that Brigid is a Christianization of the Celtic goddess. St Brigid's feast day is 1 February, and traditionally it involves weaving Brigid's crosses and many other folk customs. It was originally a pre-Christian festival called Imbolc, marking the beginning of spring. From 2023 it will be a public holiday in the Republic of Ireland, the first named after a woman. This feast day is shared by Dar Lugdach, who tradition says was her student, close companion, and successor.

#### Name

The saint has the same name as the goddess <u>Brigid</u>, derived from the <u>Proto-Celtic</u> \*Brigantī "high, exalted" and ultimately originating with <u>Proto-Indo-European</u> \*b^herģ^h-. In <u>Old Irish</u> her name was spelled <u>Brigit [6]</u> and pronounced ['bˈriyidi]. In <u>Modern Irish</u> she is also called <u>Brid. [6]</u> In <u>Welsh</u> she is called <u>Ffraid</u> (sometimes <u>mutated</u> to <u>Fraid</u>), such as in several places called <u>Llansanffraid</u>, "St. Brigit's church". She is also referred to as "the Mary of the <u>Gael</u>" and the "Mother Saint of Ireland". [8]

#### **Historicity**


There is debate over whether Brigid was a real person. There are few historical facts about her, and early <a href="https://hagiographies">hagiographies</a> "are mainly anecdotes and miracle stories, some of which are deeply rooted in Irish pagan folklore". She has the same name and many of the same attributes as the Celtic goddess <a href="Brigid">Brigid</a>, and there are many supernatural events and folk customs associated with her. Like the saint, the goddess in Irish myth is associated with poetry, healing, protection, smithcraft, and domestic animals, according to <a href="Sanas Cormaic">Sanas Cormaic</a> and <a href="Lebor Gabála Érenn">Lebor Gabála Érenn</a>. Furthermore, the saint's feast day falls on the Gaelic traditional festival of <a href="Imbolc">Imbolc</a>. Some scholars suggest that the saint is a <a href="Christianisation">Christianisation</a> of the goddess; others that she was a real person whose mythos took on the goddess's attributes. Medieval art historian Pamela Berger argues that Christian monks "took the ancient figure of the <a href="mother goddess">mother goddess</a> and grafted her name and functions onto her Christian counterpart". <a href="mother goddess">Dáithí Ó hÓgáin</a> and others suggest that the saint had been chief <a href="mother goddess">druid</a> at the temple of the goddess Brigid, was responsible for converting it into a Christian monastery, and that after her death, the name and characteristics of the goddess became attached to the saint. <a href="mother goddess">[10][12][13]</a> Noel Kissane, in a piece in <a href="mother goddess">The Catholic Historical Review</a>, argues she was a historical figure. <a href="mother goddess">[14][15]</a>

#### **Life: Sources**

Among the most ancient accounts of St Brigid are two Old Irish hymns; the first by St Ultan of Ardbraccan (died c. 657), Brigit Bé Bithmaith ('Brigid ever-excellent woman') also known as "Ultan's hymn", Ilo and the second is "Broccán's hymn", composed by St Broccán Clóen (died c. 650) at the request of Ultan who was his tutor. Two early Lives of St Brigid in Hiberno-Latin prose, the Vita Sanctae Brigitae I and II, were written in the 7th–8th centuries, the first one possibly by St Aleran (died in 665), lector of Clonard, the second by Cogitosus, a monk of Kildare. An Old Irish prose Life, Bethu Brigte, was composed in the 9th century. Several later Latin and Irish Lives of the saint were composed. The Vita III, in hexameter verse, is sometimes attributed to St Coelan of Inishcaltra of the 7th–8th centuries, but appears more likely to have been written by St Donatus, an Irish monk who became Bishop of Fiesole in 824.
