George Augustus Selwyn (5 April 1809 – 11 April 1878) was the first Anglican <u>Bishop of New Zealand</u>. He was Bishop of New Zealand (which included <u>Melanesia</u>) from 1841 to 1869. His diocese was then subdivided and Selwyn was <u>Metropolitan</u> (later called <u>Primate</u>) of New Zealand from 1858 to 1868. Returning to Britain, Selwyn served as <u>Bishop of Lichfield</u> from 1868 to 1878.

After his death, <u>Selwyn College</u>, <u>Cambridge</u> and <u>Selwyn College</u>, <u>Otago</u> were founded to honour his life and contribution to scholarship and the church. The colleges and other educational facilities uphold the legacy of the bishop.

### HOMILY

### Nicene Creed:

- We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit (+) to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him.

Sanctify us also (+) that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for even AMEN

(All are invited and welcome to come forward and receive communion in this church. We have two different ways to receive communion. First way = go to the right of the altar, receive the bread, eat the bread, then take a sip of wine from the cup. Second way = go to the left of the altar, receive the bread, dip the bread in the wine in the cup and then eat the bread. If you are not ready to receive the bread and wine, you may come forward and cross your arms over your chest to receive a blessing instead. Bread is gluten free).

<u>William Selwyn</u> (1775–1855) and of Laetitia Frances Kynaston. At the age of seven he went to <u>Great Ealing School</u>, the school of Nicholas, where the future <u>Cardinal Newman</u> and his brother <u>Francis</u> were among his schoolfellows. He then went to <u>Eton</u>, where he distinguished himself, both as scholar and as athlete, and knew <u>William Ewart Gladstone</u>.

In 1827 he became scholar of <u>St John's College, Cambridge</u>. He came out second in the <u>Classical Tripos</u> in 1831, graduating <u>Bachelor of Arts</u> (BA) 1831, <u>Cambridge Master of Arts</u> (MA Cantab) 1834, and <u>Doctor of Divinity</u> (DD) <u>per lit. reg.</u> 1842, and was a fellow of St John's from 1833 to 1840.<sup>[2]</sup> He was a member of the <u>Cambridge</u> crew which competed in the inaugural <u>Oxford and Cambridge Boat Race</u> at <u>Henley on Thames</u> in 1829.<sup>[3]</sup>

After graduating from Cambridge, Selwyn worked at Eton College, becoming assistant master and tutoring the sons of <u>Edward Herbert, 2nd Earl of Powis</u>. In 1833 he was ordained <u>deacon</u>, and in 1834, a <u>priest</u>; he acted as curate to Isaac Gosset, the vicar of <u>St John's</u>, <u>Windsor</u> from 1833 until 1841. Both at Eton and at Windsor, Selwyn displayed much organising talent. In 1841, after an episcopal council held at Lambeth had recommended the appointment of a bishop for New Zealand, <u>Charles James Blomfield</u>, <u>Bishop of London</u>, offered the post to Selwyn.

### **Bishop in New Zealand**

Consecrated at Lambeth on 17 October 1841,<sup>[4]</sup> Bishop Selwyn embarked for his new missionary diocese on 26 December.<sup>[4]</sup> He appointed <u>William Charles Cotton</u> as his chaplain. The 23 member missionary party set sail from <u>Plymouth</u> late in December 1841 on board the <u>barque</u> *Tomatin*. In addition to their luggage, the missionaries brought various animals and four hives of bees. On the outbound voyage, Selwyn studied the <u>Māori language</u> with the help of a <u>Māori</u> boy returning from England, and was able to preach in that language immediately on his arrival. He also acquired enough seamanship to enable him to be his own sailing master among the dangerous waters of the Pacific.<sup>[5]</sup> In April 1842 the *Tomatin* arrived in <u>Sydney</u>.

The boat hit a rock on landing and, rather than wait for its repair, some of the party, including Selwyn and Cotton, set sail for New Zealand on the <u>brig Bristolian</u> on 19 May. They arrived in <u>Auckland</u> on 30 May.<sup>[6]</sup> After spending some time as guests of Captain <u>William Hobson</u>, the first <u>Governor of New Zealand</u>, Selwyn and Cotton set sail on 6 June on the <u>schooner</u> *Wave* to visit the mission stations on the <u>Hauraki Gulf</u>, then north to the <u>Bay of Islands</u>. where he arrived on 20 June.<sup>[7][8]</sup> Among the party was a clerk, <u>William Bambridge</u>, who was also an accomplished artist and was later to become photographer to <u>Queen Victoria</u>.<sup>[9]</sup>

In June 1842, Selwyn set up residence at <u>Te Waimate mission</u>,<sup>[10]</sup> some 15 miles (24 km) inland from <u>Paihia</u> where the <u>Church Missionary Society</u> (CMS) had established a settlement 11 years earlier.<sup>[11]</sup>

Some buildings at Waimate were converted for use by the <u>College of St John the Evangelist</u>, to teach theology to candidates for ordination.<sup>[10]</sup> On 5 July 1842 Selwyn set out on a six-month tour of his diocese leaving the Mission Station in the care of Sarah, his wife, and Cotton. In November, Selwyn travelled on the brig *Victoria* down the west coast of the North Island to visit <u>Octavius Hadfield</u> at the <u>Otaki</u> mission and the mission at <u>Whanganui</u>; then up the east coast to visit <u>William Williams</u>.<sup>[7]</sup> By October 1843, more missionaries had arrived at Waimate, and Selwyn, accompanied by Cotton, embarked on his second tour, this time to mission stations and native settlements in the southern part of North Island.<sup>[12]</sup> Their journey was made partly by canoe but mainly by walking, often for large distances over difficult <u>Cont. online Wikipedia</u>

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
