New Testament references

The name <u>Bartholomew</u> (<u>Greek</u>: Βαρθολομαῖος, transliterated "Bartholomaios") comes from the <u>Imperial Aramaic</u>: מר-תולמי "son of <u>Talmai" [9]</u> or "son of the furrows". [9] Bartholomew is listed in the <u>New Testament</u> among the Twelve Apostles of <u>Jesus</u> in the three <u>Synoptic Gospels</u>: <u>Matthew</u>, [10] <u>Mark</u>, [11] and <u>Luke</u>, [12] and in <u>Acts of the Apostles</u>. [13]

Tradition

Eusebius of Caesarea's <u>Ecclesiastical History</u> (5:10) states that after the <u>Ascension</u>, Bartholomew went on a <u>missionary</u> tour to India, where he left behind a copy of the Gospel of Matthew. Tradition records him as serving as a missionary in <u>Mesopotamia</u> and <u>Parthia</u>, as well as <u>Lycaonia</u> and <u>Ethiopia</u> in other accounts. Popular traditions say that Bartholomew preached the Gospel in India and then went to Greater Armenia.

HOMILY


Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. AMEN.

Mission to India

Two ancient testimonies exist about the mission of Saint Bartholomew in India. These are of Eusebius of Caesarea (early 4th century) and of Saint Jerome (late 4th century). Both of these refer to this tradition while speaking of the reported visit of Saint Pantaenus to India in the 2nd century. The studies of Fr A.C. Perumalil SJ and Moraes hold that the Bombay region on the Konkan coast, a region which may have been known as the ancient city Kalyan, was the field of Saint Bartholomew's missionary activities. Previously the consensus among scholars was against the apostolate of Saint Bartholomew the Apostle in India. The majority of the scholars are skeptical about the mission of Saint Bartholomew the Apostle in India. Stallings (1703), Neander (1853), Hunter (1886), Rae (1892), Zaleski (1915) are the authors who supported the Apostolate of Saint Bartholomew in India. Scholars such as Sollerius (1669), Carpentier (1822), Harnack (1903), Medlycott (1905), Mingana (1926), Thurston (1933), Attwater (1935), etc. do not support this hypothesis. The main argument is that the India that Eusebius and Jerome refer to should be identified as Ethiopia or Arabia Felix.

In Armenia

Saint Bartholomew Monastery at the site of the Apostle's martyrdom in historical Armenia,

now ruinous



Along with his fellow apostle <u>Jude "Thaddeus"</u>, Bartholomew is reputed to have brought Christianity to Armenia in the 1st century. Thus, both saints are considered the <u>patron saints</u> of the <u>Armenian Apostolic Church</u>. According to tradition, he is the 2nd <u>Catholicos-Patriarch</u> of the <u>Armenian Apostolic Church</u>.

Christian tradition has three stories about Bartholomew's death: "One speaks of his being kidnapped, beaten unconscious, and cast into the sea to drown. Another account states that he was

<u>crucified upside down</u>, and another says that he was <u>skinned alive</u> and beheaded in <u>Albac</u> or <u>Albanopolis</u>, near <u>Baku</u>, <u>Azerbaijan</u>^[17] or <u>Başkale</u>, <u>Turkey</u>."

The most prominent tradition has it that Apostle Bartholomew was executed in <u>Albanopolis</u> in Armenia. According to popular <u>hagiography</u>, the apostle was <u>flayed</u> alive and beheaded. According to other accounts, he was crucified upside down (head downward) like <u>St. Peter</u>. He is said to have been martyred for having converted Polymius, the king of Armenia, to Christianity. Enraged by the monarch's conversion, and fearing a Roman backlash, King Polymius's brother, Prince Astyages, ordered Bartholomew's torture and execution, which Bartholomew endured. However, there are no records of any Armenian king of the <u>Arsacid dynasty of Armenia</u> with the name "Polymius". Current scholarship indicates that Bartholomew is more likely to have died in Kalyan in India, where there was an official named "Polymius".

The 13th-century <u>Saint Bartholomew Monastery</u> was a prominent Armenian monastery constructed at the site of the martyrdom of Apostle Bartholomew in <u>Vaspurakan</u>, Greater Armenia (now in southeastern Turkey). [21]
