

MORNING PRAYER FEAST OF CYPRIAN OF CARTHAGE Wednesday 13 Sept. 2023 9:30 AM



Cyprian (/'sıpriən/; Latin: Thaschus Caecilius Cyprianus; c. 210 – 14 September 258 AD^[1]) was a <u>bishop of Carthage</u> and an <u>early Christian</u> writer of <u>Berber</u> descent, many of whose Latin works are extant. He is recognized as a <u>saint</u> in the <u>Western</u> and <u>Eastern</u> churches.

He was born around the beginning of the 3rd century in <u>North Africa</u>, perhaps at <u>Carthage</u>,^[5] where he received a classical education. Soon after converting to Christianity, he became a bishop in 249. A controversial figure during his lifetime, his strong pastoral skills, firm conduct during the <u>Novatianist</u> heresy and outbreak of the <u>Plague of Cyprian</u> (named after him due to his description of it), and eventual <u>martyrdom</u> at Carthage established his reputation and proved his sanctity in the eyes of the Church. Jubilate (*For the Gloria*):

Be joyful in the Lord, all you lands; * serve the Lord with gladness and come before his presence with a song. Know this: The Lord himself is God; * he himself has made us, and we are his; we are his people and the sheep of his pasture. Enter his gates with thanksgiving; go into his courts with praise; * give thanks to him and call upon his Name. The Lessons (*Please be seated*) **First Lesson: A Reading from the Book of James (4:11-17)**

Do not speak evil against one another, brothers and sisters. Whoever speaks evil against another or judges another, speaks evil against the law and judges the law; but if you judge the law, you are not a doer of the law but a judge. There is one lawgiver and judge who is able to save and to destroy. So who, then, are you to judge your neighbor? Come now, you who say, "Today or tomorrow we will go to such and such a town and spend a year there, doing business and making money." Yet you do not even know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes. Instead you ought to say, "If the Lord wishes, we will live and do this or that." As it is, you boast in your arrogance; all such boasting is evil. Anyone, then, who knows the right thing to do and fails to do it, commits sin.

Reader: The Word of the Lord **People: Thanks be to God**

Psalm 116:10-17

Gospel Lesson:

Deacon/Reader: The holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew John (10:11-16)

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away-- and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd."

Deacon/Reader: The Gospel of the Lord **People: Thanks be to God**

Reflection on readings / homily (optional)

The Apostles Creed:

Deacon/Leader: Let us say together the Apostles' Creed:

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth;

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again.

He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

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led to his being considered the pre-eminent Latin writer of <u>Western Christianity</u> until <u>Jerome</u> and <u>Augustine</u>.^[6]

<u>Early life</u>

Cyprian was born into a rich pagan <u>Berber</u> (<u>Roman African</u>),^[5] Carthaginian family sometime during the early third century. His original name was Thascius; he took the additional name <u>Caecilius</u> in memory of the <u>priest</u> to whom he owed his conversion.^[7] Before his conversion, he was a leading member of a legal fraternity in Carthage, an orator, a "pleader in the courts", and a teacher of rhetoric.^[8] After a "dissipated youth", Cyprian was baptized when he was thirty-five years old,^[2] c. 245 AD. After his <u>baptism</u>, he gave away a portion of his wealth to the poor of <u>Carthage</u>, as befitted a man of his status.

In the early days of his conversion, he wrote an *Epistola ad Donatum de gratia Dei* and the *Testimoniorum Libri III* that adhere closely to the models of <u>Tertullian</u>, who influenced his style and thinking. Cyprian described his own conversion and baptism in the following words: When I was still lying in darkness and gloomy night, I used to regard it as extremely difficult and demanding to do what God's mercy was suggesting to me... I myself was held in bonds by the innumerable errors of my previous life, from which I did not believe I could possibly be delivered, so I was disposed to acquiesce in my clinging vices and to indulge my sins... But after that, with the help of the water of new birth, the stain of my former life was washed away, and a light from above, serene and pure, was infused into my reconciled heart... a second birth restored me to a new man. Then, in a wondrous manner, every doubt began to fade... I clearly understood that what had first lived within me, enslaved by the vices of the flesh, was earthly and that what, instead, the Holy Spirit had wrought within me was divine and heavenly.^[9]

Contested election as bishop of Carthage

Not long after his baptism he was <u>ordained</u> a deacon and soon afterwards a priest. Sometime between July 248 and April 249, he was elected <u>bishop of Carthage</u>, a popular choice among the poor who remembered his patronage as demonstrating good <u>equestrian</u> style. However, his rapid rise did not meet with the approval of senior members of the clergy in Carthage,^[10] an opposition that did not disappear during his <u>episcopate</u>.

Not long afterward, the entire community was put to an unwanted test. Christians in North Africa had not suffered persecution for many years; the Church was assured and lax. In early 250, the <u>Decian persecution</u> began.^[11] <u>Emperor Decius</u> issued an edict, the text of which is lost, ordering sacrifices to the gods to be made throughout the <u>Empire</u>.^[12] Jews were specifically exempted from that requirement.^[13] Cyprian chose to go into hiding, rather than face potential execution. While some clergy saw that decision as a sign of cowardice, Cyprian defended himself by saying that he had fled in order not to leave the faithful without a shepherd during the persecution and that his decision to continue to lead them, although from a distance, was in accordance with divine will. Moreover, he pointed to the actions of the Apostles and Jesus himself: "And therefore the Lord commanded us in the persecution to depart and to flee; and both taught that this should be done, and Himself did it. For as the crown is given by the condescension of God, and cannot be received unless the hour comes for accepting it, whoever abiding in Christ departs for a while does not deny his faith, <u>Cont. online</u>





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
