FEAST OF FRANCIS OF ASSISI Wednesday, 4 October 2023 9:30am

Giovanni di Pietro di Bernardone (c. 1181 - 3 October 1226), known as Francis of Assisi OFM,^[a] was an Italian mystic and Catholic friar who founded the Franciscans. He was inspired to lead a life of poverty as an itinerant preacher. One of the most venerated figures in <u>Christianity</u>,^{[4][1]} Francis was canonized by Pope Gregory IX on 16 July 1228. He is usually depicted in a brown habit with a rope around his waist with three knots, symbolizing the three Franciscan vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. In 1219, he went to Egypt in an attempt to convert the sultan al-Kamil and put an end to the conflict of the Fifth Crusade.^[5] In 1223, he arranged for the first live nativity scene as part of the annual Christmas celebration in Greccio. [b][6][7] According to Christian tradition, in 1224 Francis received the stigmata during the apparition of a Seraphic angel in a religious ecstasv.^[8]



SERMON/HOMILY



the women's <u>Order of St. Clare</u>, the <u>Third Order of St. Francis</u> and the <u>Custody of the Holy Land</u>. Once his community was authorized by <u>Pope Innocent III</u>, he withdrew increasingly from external affairs.

Francis is associated with patronage of animals and the <u>environment</u>. It became customary for churches to hold ceremonies blessing animals on his <u>feast day</u> of 4 October. He is known for devotion to the <u>Eucharist</u>.^[9] Along with <u>Catherine of Siena</u>, he was designated <u>patron saint</u> of <u>Italy</u>. <u>San Francisco</u> in <u>California</u>, <u>United States</u>, is named after him.

<u>Names</u>

Francis (<u>Italian</u>: *Francesco d'Assisi*; <u>Latin</u>: *Franciscus Assisiensis*) was baptized Giovanni by his mother. His surnames, di Pietro di Bernardone, come from his father, Pietro di Bernardone. The latter was in France on business when Francis was born in <u>Assisi</u>, a small town in Italy. Upon his return, Pietro took to calling his son Francesco ("Free man" or "Frenchman"), possibly in honor of his commercial success and enthusiasm for all things French.^[10]

His full name contemporarily could be translated to John Peter "Francis" Bernardone.

Biography

<u>Early life</u>

Francis of Assisi was born c. 1181,^{[11][12]} one of the children of an <u>Italian</u> father, Pietro di Bernardone dei Moriconi, a prosperous silk merchant, and a <u>French</u> mother, Pica di Bourlemont, about whom little is known except that she was a noblewoman originally from <u>Provence</u>.^[13] Indulged by his parents, Francis lived the high-spirited life typical of a wealthy young man.^[8] As a youth, Francis became a devotee of <u>troubadours</u> and was fascinated with all things <u>Transalpine</u>.^[10] He was handsome, witty, gallant, and delighted in fine clothes. He spent money lavishly.^[7] Although many <u>hagiographers</u> remark about his bright clothing, rich friends, and love of pleasures,^[13] his displays of disillusionment toward the world that surrounded him came fairly early in his life, as is shown in the "story of the beggar". In this account, he was selling cloth and velvet in the marketplace on behalf of his father when a beggar came to him and asked for <u>alms</u>. At the conclusion of his business deal, Francis abandoned his wares and ran after the beggar. When he found him, Francis gave the man everything he had in his pockets. His friends mocked him for his charity; his father scolded him in rage.^[14]

Around 1202, he joined a military expedition against <u>Perugia</u> and was taken as a prisoner at Collestrada. He spent a year as a captive,^[15] during which an illness caused him to re-evaluate his life. However, upon his return to Assisi in 1203, Francis returned to his carefree life. In 1205, Francis left for <u>Apulia</u> to enlist in the army of <u>Walter III, Count of Brienne</u>. A strange vision made him return to Assisi and lose interest in the worldly life.^[8] According to <u>hagio-graphic</u> accounts, thereafter he began to avoid the sports and feasts of his former companions. A friend asked him whether he was thinking of marrying, to which he answered: "Yes, a fairer bride than any of you have ever seen", meaning his "Lady Poverty".^[7]

On a <u>pilgrimage</u> to Rome, he joined the poor in begging at <u>St. Peter's Basilica</u>.^[8] He spent some time in lonely places, asking God for <u>spiritual enlightenment</u>. He said he had a mystical <u>vision of Jesus Christ</u> in the forsaken country chapel of <u>San Damiano</u>, just outside Assisi, in which the <u>Icon of Christ Crucified</u> said to him, "Francis, Francis, go and repair My church which, as you can see, is falling into ruins."
