is one of the <u>Four Evangelists</u>—the four traditionally ascribed authors of the <u>canonical</u> <u>gospels</u>. The Early <u>Church Fathers</u> ascribed to him authorship of both the <u>Gospel of Luke</u> and the <u>Acts of the Apostles</u>. Prominent figures in early Christianity such as <u>Jerome</u> and <u>Eusebius</u> later reaffirmed his authorship, although a lack of conclusive evidence as to the identity of the author of the works has led to <u>discussion</u> in scholarly circles, both secular and religious.

The New Testament mentions Luke briefly a few times, and the <u>Epistle to the Colossians</u>^[3] refers to him as a physician (from Greek for 'one who heals'); thus he is thought to have been both a physician and a disciple of <u>Paul</u>. Since the early years of the faith, Christians have regarded him as a <u>saint</u>. He is believed to have been a <u>martyr</u>, reportedly having been hanged from an olive tree, though some believe otherwise.^[b] The <u>Catholic Church</u> and other major denomina- <u>Continued Pg10</u>

SERMON/HOMILY

Continued from front tions venerate him as **Saint Luke the Evangelist** and as a <u>patron</u> saint of artists, physicians, <u>bachelors</u>, surgeons, students and butchers; his <u>feast day</u> is 18 October. [4][5]

<u>Life</u>

Many scholars believe that Luke was a physician who lived in the <u>Hellenistic</u> city of <u>Antioch</u> in Ancient <u>Syria</u>,^[c] born of a Greek family,^{[7][8]} although some scholars and theologians think Luke was a <u>Hellenic Jew</u>.^{[9][10]} While it has been widely accepted that the theology of <u>Luke</u>– <u>Acts</u> points to a <u>gentile</u> Christian writing for a gentile audience, some have concluded that it is more plausible that Luke–Acts is directed to a community made up of both Jewish and gentile Christians since there is stress on the scriptural roots of the gentile mission (see the use of Isaiah 49:6 in Luke–Acts).^{[11][12]} DNA testing on what <u>Christian tradition</u> holds to be his body has revealed it to be of <u>Syrian</u> ancestry.^[13]

Whether Luke was a Jew or gentile, or something in between, it is clear from the quality of the Greek language used in Luke-Acts that <u>the author</u>, held in Christian tradition to be Luke, was one of the most highly educated of the authors of the New Testament. The author's conscious and intentional allusions and references to, and quotations of, ancient Classical and Hellenistic Greek authors, such as Homer, Aesop, Epimenides, Euripides, Plato, and Aratus indicate that they were familiar with actual Greek literary texts. This familiarity most likely derived from their experiences as a youth of the very homogeneous Hellenistic educational curriculum ($\dot{\epsilon}\gamma\kappa \acute{o}\kappa\lambda \log \pi \alpha \delta \acute{o}(\alpha, enkyklios paideia$) that had been, and would continue to be, used for centuries throughout the eastern Mediterranean.^[14]

Luke's earliest mention is in the <u>Epistle to Philemon</u>, chapter 1, verse 24.^[15] He is also mentioned in Colossians 4:14^[16] and 2 Timothy 4:11,^[17] both traditionally held to be <u>Pauline</u> <u>epistles</u> (see <u>Authorship of the Pauline epistles</u>).^{[18][19][20][21][22]} The next earliest account of Luke is in the <u>anti-Marcionite prologue</u> to the Gospel of Luke, a document once thought to date to the 2nd century, but which has more recently been dated to the later 4th century.^{[citation} <u>needed</u>]

Luke's presence in <u>Rome</u> with the Apostle Paul near the end of Paul's life was attested by 2 Timothy 4:11: "Only Luke is with me". In the last chapter of the Book of Acts, widely attributed to Luke, there are several accounts in the first person also affirming Luke's presence in Rome, including Acts 28:16:^[27] "And when we came to Rome..." According to some accounts, Luke also contributed to the <u>authorship of the Epistle to the Hebrews</u>.^[28] Luke died at age 84 in <u>Boeotia</u>, according to a "fairly early and widespread tradition".^[29] According to <u>Nikephoros Kallistos Xanthopoulos</u>, Greek historian of the 14th century (and others), Luke's tomb was located in <u>Thebes</u>, whence his relics were transferred to <u>Constantinople</u> in the year 357.^[30]

Authorship of Luke and Acts

The Gospel of Luke does not name its author.^{[31][32][33][34]} The Gospel was not, nor does it claim to be, written by direct witnesses to the reported events, unlike Acts beginning in the sixteenth chapter.^{[35][36][37]} However, in most translations the author suggests that they have investigated the book's events and notes the name (Theophilus) of that to whom they are writing.
