


Thank you card for the Jewish temple who donated the digital organ

November is Stewardship Month:

Paying it Forward, Paying it Back! This is our theme this year as we look forward to those who come after us and backwards to those who preceded us. We hope you will gratefully and generously support our church and the things we do to live our mission of being "called to love and serve."

Every year your vestry looks at the donations and expenses from the last year and with the donations that are pledged (promised) for the coming year, build the anticipated budget for the coming year. We rely on the giving from our congregation to establish our budget and we cannot be a church without your giving. Some of you may be reluctant to pledge (promise) what you hope to give in the coming year due to your own circumstances. We understand that, and we hope you also understand that it is hard to develop a budget without knowing what to expect throughout the year in donations.

We are very grateful for your giving this year!

We are so thankful for your donations this past year. We have been able to continue to both take care of our church with its needs and also to be a source of support for many in our community. We had a couple of big projects this year that we needed to take care of and your generosity allowed us to complete them.

Many of you know that the original linoleum tile floor was cracking and breaking in several places in the church and that the glue used to hold those tiles contained asbestos. It was a major safety concern that we get that old floor replaced as soon as possible to eliminate the threat to our health from that flooring. We had the old flooring removed and replaced it with a new poured aspartic flooring. We also replaced the old stained and torn carpet with new carpet around the altar area.

Our parking lot received two improvements: The parking lot lights were switched over to LED lights which should burn longer and use less energy. The pavement was resurfaced and repainted as it was beginning to be hard to see the lines.

Other more routine maintenance items included termite treatment under the education building, replacing a faulty microwave oven, some landscaping needs, and soon new gutters on both buildings.

In serving our community, your donations allowed us to:

- continue to provide "Better Bucks" for some of our neighbors who are struggling economically to buy food and personal hygiene items,
- we helped some people with rent and utility bills when they could not pay those bills,
- we supported the rebuilding needed by St. Stephen's in Douglas after the arson fire,
- we supported the people in Lahaina Hawaii after a wildfire destroyed the church and town there,
- we gave food donations to the community food banks in Cochise County,
- we gave school supplies to two elementary schools in McNeal and Double Adobe in Cochise County, and
- we have donated and continue to donate our aluminum cans to the animal shelter in Sierra Vista for their ongoing needs to care for those animals in their pens.

Thank you for all that you give out of love of God, our neighbor, and ourselves. You make a difference in the lives of many whom you may never know or meet.



Christmas Worship Services:

This year, as happens from time to time, we have 4th Advent on the same Sunday as Christmas Eve. Therefore, we are planning to have our 4th Advent service on Saturday night Dec 23rd. Then on Sunday December 24th there will not be a morning service. We will have only our Christmas Eve service at 5pm that Sunday. If at least 6 people plan to attend Christmas Day service on Monday December 25th we will have a Christmas Day service as well with a small brunch to follow. Otherwise, if fewer than 6 plan to attend Christmas Day, we will ask that folks let Christmas Eve be the main Christmas service and will not have a Christmas Day service.



Become an advocate for peace in Israel-Palestine:

Sometimes it is hard to know what we can do to promote peace when conflicts arise. The Episcopal Church has an office for Government Relations with a website to find resources of information and actions you can take concerning the conflict in Israel and Gaza. From your editor!

Dear Readers,

In September I was given the opportunity to sit with May Sowards whilst her son, Mark, attended a medical appointment. What a lovely experience that was for me. It has been a very long time since I have had a conversation with a 'senior' who has had so much experience of life and who has gained so much wisdom and insight through her experiences.

She talked about her love of books (of which she has many) especially history books. She talked about her relatives and there is a fascinating family tree (with photos) on the wall.

She also mentioned the respite home where she had spent some time during Mark's hospitalisation and recovery time. She recalled that (without any blame) she found some staff to be impatient and occasionally a little rough with her. She was aware that she had become rather slow to respond and sometimes forgetful (and how many of us wouldn't be in our nineties?) but this reminded me of a poem I read when my mother started to suffer from Alzheimer's disease, from her mid-sixties. Eventually, after my father passed, she had to go to a care home where she could receive 24 hour supervision.

Here is the poem:

A Crabbit Old Woman

What do you see nurse, what do you see? What are you thinking when you're looking at me?

A crabbit old woman, not very wise,
Uncertain of habit, with far away eyes,
Who dribbles her food, and makes no reply, when you say in a loud voice,
'I do wish you'd try'

Who seems not to notice the things that you do, and forever is losing a stocking or shoe Who, unresisting or not, lets you do as you will with bathing and feeding, the long day to fill.

Is that what you're thinking, is that what you see? Then open your eyes nurse, you're not looking at Me. I'll tell you who I am as I sit here so still, as I move at your bidding; as I eat at your will.

I'm a small child of 10 with a father and mother, brothers and sisters, who loved one another-

A young girl of 16 with wings on her feet, dreaming that soon now a lover she'll meet,

A bride soon at 20- my heart gives a leap, remembering the vows that I promised to keep.

At 25 now I have young of my own who need me to build a secure happy home;

A woman of 30, my young now grow fast, bound to each other with ties that should last;

At 40, my young ones have grown and are gone, but my man's beside me to see I don't mourn;

At 50 once more babies play 'round my knee, again we know children, my loved one and me.

Dark days are upon me, my husband is dead, I look at the future, I shudder with dread, For my young are all busy rearing young of their own and I think of the years and the love I have known.

I'm an old woman now and nature is cruel, Tis her jest to make old age look like a fool.

The body it crumbles, grace and vigor depart, And now there is a stone where once was a heart.

But inside my old carcass a young girl still dwells, And now and again my battered heart swells.

I remember the joys, I remember the pain, and I'm loving and living all over again.

I think of the years all too few, gone so fast and accept the stark fact that nothing can last. (Continued)
