


Anthony the Great (Greek: Ἀντώνιος : Latinآلقديس أنطونيوس الكبير: : : Antónios; <u>Arabic</u> Antonius; Coptic: DDDDDDD; c. 12 January 251 – 17 January 356) was a Christian monk from Egypt, revered since his death as a saint. He is distinguished from other saints named Anthony, such as Anthony of Padua, by various epithets: Anthony of Egypt, Anthony the Abbot, Anthony of the Desert, Anthony the Anchorite, Anthony the Hermit, and Anthony of Thebes. For his importance among the Desert Fathers and to all later Christian monasticism, he is also known as the Father of All Monks. Sermon/Meditation

Nicene Creed (Traditional)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made.

The people stand, sit, or kneel.

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son.

For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said,:

"Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said,

"Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts (+) that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant.

Latin translations. He is often erroneously considered the first Christian monk, but as his biography and other sources make clear, there were many ascetics before him. Anthony was, however, among the first known to go into the wilderness (about AD 270), which seems to have contributed to his renown.^[6] Accounts of Anthony enduring supernatural temptation during his sojourn in the Eastern Desert of Egypt inspired the depiction of his temptations in visual art and literature.

Anthony is appealed to against infectious diseases, particularly skin diseases. In the past, many such afflictions, including <u>ergotism</u>, <u>erysipelas</u>, and <u>shingles</u>, were referred to as *Saint Anthony's fire*.

Life of Anthony

Most of what is known about Anthony comes from the *Life of Anthony*. Written in Greek around 360 by <u>Athanasius of Alexandria</u>, it depicts Anthony as an illiterate and holy man who through his existence in a primordial landscape has an absolute connection to the divine truth, which always is in harmony with that of Athanasius as the biographer.^[6]

A continuation of the genre of secular <u>Greek biography</u>,^[7] it became his most widely read work. ^[8] Sometime before 374 it was translated into Latin by <u>Evagrius of Antioch</u>. The Latin translation helped the *Life* become one of the best-known works of literature in the Christian world, a status it would hold through the <u>Middle Ages</u>.^[9]

Translated into several languages, it became something of a "best seller" in its day and played an important role in the spreading of the <u>ascetic</u> ideal in Eastern and Western Christianity. It later served as an inspiration to Christian <u>monastics</u> in both the East and the West,^[10] and helped to spread the concept of Christian monasticism, particularly in Western Europe via its Latin translations.

Many stories are also told about Anthony in the *Sayings of the Desert Fathers*.

Anthony probably spoke only his native language, <u>Coptic</u>, but his sayings were spread in a <u>Greek</u> translation. He himself dictated letters in Coptic, seven of which are extant.^[11]

<u>Life</u>

Early years

Anthony was born in <u>Koma</u> in <u>Lower Egypt</u> to wealthy landowner parents. When he was about 20 years old, his parents died and left him with the care of his unmarried sister. Shortly thereafter, he decided to follow the gospel exhortation in <u>Matthew 19</u>: 21, "If you want to be perfect, go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasures in heaven." Anthony gave away some of his family's lands to his neighbors, sold the remaining property, and donated the funds to the poor.^[12] He then left to live an <u>ascetic</u> life,^[12] placing his sister with a group of <u>Christian virgins</u>.^[13]


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
For the next fifteen years, Anthony remained in the area,^[14] spending the first years as the disciple of another local <u>hermit</u>.^[4] There are various legends that he worked as a <u>swineherd</u> during this period.^[15]
