Bernard of Clairvaux, O. Cist. (Latin: Bernardus Claraevallensis; 1090 – 20 August 1153), venerated as Saint Bernard, was an abbot, mystic, co-founder of the Knights Templar, and a major leader in the reformation of the Benedictine Order through the nascent Cistercian Order.

He was sent to found <u>Clairvaux Abbey</u> at an isolated clearing in a glen known as the *Val d'Absinthe*, about 15 kilometres (9 mi) southeast of <u>Bar-sur-Aube</u>. In the year 1128, Bernard attended the <u>Council of Troyes</u>, at which he traced the outlines of the Rule of the Knights Templar, which soon became an ideal of Christian nobility.

On the death of <u>Pope Honorius II</u> in 1130, a schism arose in the church. Bernard was a major proponent of <u>Pope Innocent II</u>, arguing effectively for his legitimacy

Gospel Lesson:

Deacon: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to

Mark (10:23-31)

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SERMON

Nicene Creed (Traditional)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. From the primal elements you brought forth the human race, and blessed us with memory, reason, and skill. You made us the rulers of creation.


But we turned against you, and betrayed your trust; and we turned against one another.

The Presider continues

And so, Father, we who have been redeemed by him, and made a new people by water and the Spirit, now bring before you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit (+) to be the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ our Lord.

On the night he was betrayed he took bread, said the blessing, broke the bread, and gave it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

Continued from front: over the Antipope Anacletus II.

The eloquent abbot advocated crusades in general and convinced many to participate in the unsuccessful <u>Second Crusade</u>, notably through a famous sermon at <u>Vézelay (1146)</u>. Bernard was <u>canonized</u> just 21 years after his death by <u>Pope Alexander III</u>. In 1830 <u>Pope Pius</u> VIII declared him a <u>Doctor</u> of the Church.

Early life (1090-1113)

Bernard's parents were <u>Tescelin de Fontaine</u>, lord of <u>Fontaine-lès-Dijon</u>, and <u>Alèthe de Montbard</u> <u>Ifil</u>, both members of the highest nobility of <u>Burgundy</u>. Bernard was the third of seven children, six of whom were sons. Aged nine, he was sent to a school at <u>Châtillon-sur-Seine</u> run by the <u>secular canons</u> of Saint-Vorles. Bernard had an interest in literature and rhetoric. He had a special devotion to the <u>Virgin Mary</u>, and he later wrote several works about the <u>Queen of Heaven</u>. [3]

The Vision of St Bernard, by Fra Bartolommeo, c. 1504 (Uffizi)


Bernard emphasized the value of personal, experiential friendship with Christ and placed new emphasis on the Virgin Mary. In opposition to the rational approach to divine understanding used by the <u>scholastics</u>, Bernard preached an immediate faith, in which the best intercessor was the Virgin Mary.

Bernard's mother died when he was a youth. During his education with priests, he often thought of becoming one. In 1098, a group led by <u>Robert of Molesme</u> had founded <u>Cîteaux Abbey</u>, near <u>Dijon</u>, with the purpose of living according to a literal interpretation of the <u>Rule of St Benedict</u>. They established new administrative structures among their monsteries, effectively creating a new order, known, after the first abbey, as the <u>Order of Cistercians</u>. After his mother died, Bernard decided to go to Cîteaux. In 1113 he and thirty other young noblemen of Burgundy sought admission into the new monastery. Bernard's example was so convincing that scores (among them his siblings and other relatives) followed him into the monastic life.

Abbot of Clairvaux (1115-28)

The little community of reformed <u>Benedictines</u> at <u>Cîteaux</u> grew rapidly. Three years after entering, Bernard was sent with a group of twelve monks to found a new house at Vallée d'Absinthe, in the <u>Diocese of Langres</u>. This Bernard named *Claire Vallée*, or *Clairvaux*, on 25 June 1115, and the names of Bernard and Clairvaux soon became inseparable. During the absence of the <u>Bishop of Langres</u>, Bernard was blessed as <u>abbot</u> by <u>William of Champeaux</u>, <u>Bishop of Châlons-sur-Marne</u>. From then on a strong friendship grew between the abbot and the bishop, who was professor of theology at <u>Notre Dame of Paris</u> and the founder of <u>St. Victor Abbey in Paris</u>.

The beginnings of <u>Clairvaux Abbey</u> were austere; Bernard soon became ill. Nonetheless, candidates for the monastic life flocked to it in great numbers. Even his father and all his brothers entered Cîteaux, leaving only <u>Humbeline</u>, his sister, in the secular world. She, with the consent of her husband, later took the veil in the <u>Benedictine nunnery</u> of <u>Jully-les-Nonnains</u>. <u>Gerard of Clairvaux</u>, Bernard's older brother, became the <u>cellarer</u> of Cîteaux. Clairvaux soon started founding new communities. In 1118 <u>Trois-Fontaines Abbey</u> was founded in the <u>diocese of Châlons</u>; in 1119 <u>Fontenay Abbey</u> in the <u>Diocese of Autun</u>; and in 1121 <u>Foigny Abbey</u> near <u>Vervins</u>. <u>Continued online</u>
