Hugh Latimer (c. 1487 – 16 October 1555) was a Fellow of Clare College, Cambridge, and Bishop of Worcester during the Reformation, and later Church of England chaplain to King Edward VI. In 1555 under the Catholic Queen Mary I he was burned at the stake, becoming

one of the three Oxford Martyrs of Anglicanism.

<u>Life</u>

Nicholas Ridley

Latimer was born into a family of farmers in <u>Thurcaston</u>,

Leicestershire. His birthdate is unknown. Contemporary
biographers including John Foxe placed the date somewhere

between 1480 and 1494. He later recalled that "my father...kept me to schole" [11] and he started his studies in Latin grammar at the age of four, but not much else is known of his childhood. He attended the <u>University of Cambridge</u> from the age of 14,^[2] where according to the <u>Alumni Cantabrigienses</u> he was a pupil of <u>John Watson</u> and probably a scholar of

SERMON (Sherry Simon)

Nicene Creed All say together (CONTEMPORARY VERSION)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.





Peterhouse. [3] He was elected a fellow of Clare College on 2 February 1510, and in either that or the following year was awarded his Bachelor of Arts degree. [3] He received a Master of Arts degree in April 1514 and was ordained a priest on 15 July 1515. In 1522, Latimer was nominated to the positions of university preacher and university chaplain. While carrying out his official duties, he continued with theological studies and received the Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1524. The subject of his disputation for the degree was a refutation of the new ideas of the Reformation emerging from the Continent, in particular the doctrines of Philipp Melanchthon. [4] Up to this time, Latimer described himself as "obstinate a papist as any was in England". A recent convert to the new teachings, Thomas Bilney heard his disputation and later came to him to give his confession. [5] Bilney's words had a great impact on Latimer and from that day forward he accepted the reformed doctrines. [6] Continued online


Nicholas Ridley (c. 1500 – 16 October 1555) was an English Bishop of London (the only bishop called "Bishop of London and Westminster" Ridley was one of the Oxford Martyrs burned at the stake during the Marian Persecutions, for his teachings and his support of Lady Jane Grey. He is remembered with a commemoration in the calendar of saints (with Hugh Latimer) in some parts of the Anglican Communion (Church of England) on 16 October. [2]

Early years and advancement (c.1500-50)

Ridley came from a prominent family in <u>Tynedale</u>, <u>Northumberland</u>. He was the second son of Christopher Ridley, first cousin of <u>Lancelot Ridley</u> and grew up in <u>Unthank Hall</u> from the old House of Unthank located on the site of an ancient watch tower or <u>pele tower</u>. As a boy, Ridley was educated at the <u>Royal Grammar School</u>, <u>Newcastle</u>, and <u>Pembroke College</u>, <u>Cambridge</u>, where he proceeded to <u>Master of Arts</u> in 1525. Soon afterward he was ordained as a <u>priest</u> and went to the <u>Sorbonne</u>, in <u>Paris</u>, for further education. After returning to England around 1529, he became the senior proctor of Cambridge University in 1534. Around that time there was significant debate about the <u>Pope</u>'s supremacy. Ridley was well versed on <u>Biblical hermeneutics</u>, and through his arguments the university came up with the following resolution: "That the Bishop of Rome had no more authority and jurisdiction derived to him from God, in this kingdom of England, than any other foreign bishop." He graduated <u>B.D.</u> in 1537 and was then appointed by the Archbishop of Canterbury, <u>Thomas Cranmer</u>, to serve as one of his chaplains. In April 1538, Cranmer made him vicar of <u>Herne</u>, in Kent. [6].....

Thomas Cranmer (2 July 1489 – 21 March 1556) was a religious figure
Who was leader of the English Reformation and Archbishop of Canterbury during the reigns of
Henry VIII, Edward VI and, for a short time, Mary I. He helped build the case for the
annulment of Henry's marriage to Catherine of Aragon, which was one of the causes of the
separation of the English Church from union with the Holy See. Along with Thomas Cromwell,
he supported the principle of royal supremacy, in which the king was considered sovereign over
the Church within his realm.

During Cranmer's tenure as Archbishop of Canterbury, he established the first <u>doctrinal</u> and <u>liturgical</u> structures of the reformed <u>Church of England</u>. Under Henry's rule, Cranmer did not make many radical changes in the Church due to power struggles between religious conservatives and reformers. He published the first officially authorised <u>vernacular</u> service, the <u>Exhortation and Litany</u>.
