FEAST OF THOMAS AQUINAS

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Thomas Aquinas OP (/ə'kwatnəs/ \square <u>ə-KWY-nəs;</u> <u>Italian: Tommaso d'Aquino, lit.</u> 'Thomas of <u>Aquino';</u> c. 1225 – 7 March 1274) was an Italian^[6] <u>Dominican friar</u> and <u>priest</u>, the foremost <u>Scholastic</u> thinker,^[7] as well as one of the most influential philosophers and theologians in the Western tradition.^[8] He was from the county of <u>Aquino</u> in the <u>Kingdom of Sicily</u>.

Thomas was a proponent of <u>natural theology</u> and the father of a school of thought (encompassing both theology and philosophy) known as <u>Thomism</u>. Central to his thought was the doctrine of <u>natural</u> <u>law</u>, which he argued was accessible to <u>human</u> <u>reason</u> and grounded in the very nature of human beings, providing a basis for understanding <u>individual rights</u> and <u>moral duties</u>.^[9] He argued that God is the source of the light of natural reason and the light of faith.^[10] He embraced^[11] several ideas put forward by <u>Aristotle</u> and attempted to synthesize <u>Aristotelian philosophy</u> with the principles of Christianity.^[12] Aquinas' natural law

The Word of God: (please be seated)

First Lesson: A reading from the book of Wisdom (7:7-14): I prayed, and understanding was given me; I called on God, and the spirit of wisdom came to me. I preferred her to scepters and thrones, and I accounted wealth as nothing in comparison with her. Neither did I liken to her any priceless gem, because all gold is but a little sand in her sight, and silver will be accounted as clay before her. I loved her more than health and beauty, and I chose to have her rather than light, because her radiance never ceases. All good things came to me along with her, and in her hands uncounted wealth. I rejoiced in them all, because wisdom leads them; but I did not know that she was their mother. I learned without guile and I impart without grudging; I do not hide her wealth, for it is an unfailing treasure for mortals; those who get it obtain friendship with God, commended for the gifts that come from instruction.

The Psalm: Psalm 119:97-104

Gospel Lesson: Matthew (13:24-30):

Jesus put before the crowd another parable: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well. And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?' He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' The slaves said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and gather them?' But he replied, 'No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"

Sermon

Nicene Creed (Contemporary Version) All say together:

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

Continued from front: theory has been influential in shaping ideas about <u>human liberty</u> and the <u>moral limits of</u> <u>government authority</u>.^{[13][14]} He has been described as "the most influential thinker of the medieval period"^[15] and "the greatest of the medieval philosopher-theologians".^[16]

Thomas's best-known works are the unfinished Summa Theologica, or Summa Theologiae (1265–1274), the Disputed Questions on Truth (1256–1259) and the Summa contra Gentiles (1259–1265). His commentaries on Christian Scripture and on Aristotle also form an important part of his body of work. He is also notable for his Eucharistic hymns, which form a part of the Church's liturgy.^[17]

As a Doctor of the Church, Thomas Aquinas is considered one of the Catholic Church's greatest theologians and philosophers.^[18] He is known in Catholic theology as the *Doctor Angelicus* ("Angelic Doctor", with the title "doctor" meaning "teacher"), and the Doctor Communis ("Universal Doctor").^[a] In 1999, John Paul II added a new title to these traditional ones: Doctor Humanitatis ("Doctor of Humanity/Humaneness").^[19]

Biography

Early life (1225-1244)

Thomas Aquinas was most likely born in the family castle of Roccasecca,^[20] near Aquino, controlled at that time by the Kingdom of Sicily (in present-day Lazio, Italy), c. 1225.^[21] He

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
was born to the most powerful branch of the family, and his father, Landulf of Aquino, was a man of means. As a knight in the service of Emperor Frederick II, Landulf of Aquino held the title *miles*.^[22] Thomas's mother, Theodora, belonged to the Rossi branch of the Neapolitan Caracciolo family.^[23] Landulf's brother Sinibald was abbot of Monte Cassino, the oldest Benedictine monastery. While the rest of the family's sons pursued military careers, ^[24] the family intended for Thomas to follow his uncle into the abbacy;^[25] this would have been a normal career path for a younger son of Southern Italian nobility.^[26]

At the age of five Thomas began his early education at Monte Cassino, but after the military conflict between Emperor Frederick II and Pope Gregory IX spilt into the abbey in early 1239, Landulf and Theodora had Thomas enrolled at the *studium generale* (university) established by Frederick in <u>Naples</u>.^[27] There, his teacher in arithmetic, geometry, astronomy, and music was <u>Petrus de Ibernia</u>.^[28] It was at this university that Thomas was presumably introduced to Aristotle, Averroes and Maimonides, all of whom would influence his theological philosophy. ^[29] During his study at Naples, Thomas also came under the influence of John of St. Julian, a Dominican preacher in Naples, who was part of the active effort by the Dominican Order to recruit devout followers.^[30]

At the age of nineteen, Thomas resolved to join the Dominican Order. His change of heart, however, did not please his family.^[31] In an attempt to prevent Theodora's interference in Thomas's choice, the Dominicans arranged to move Thomas to Rome, and from Rome, to Paris. ^[32] However, while on his journey to Rome, per Theodora's instructions, his brothers seized him as he was drinking from a spring and took him back to his parents at the castle of Monte San Giovanni Campano.^[32]

Thomas was held prisoner for almost one year in the family castles at Monte San Giovanni and Roccasecca in an attempt to prevent him from assuming the Dominican habit and to push him into renouncing his new aspiration.^[29] Political concerns prevented the

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
