THE FEAST OF SAINT JOSEPH

In the face of From Lessor Feasts & Fasts circumstances that

distressed even a man of such tenderness and obedience to God as Joseph, he accepted the vocation of protecting Mary and being a father to Jesus. He is honored in Christian tradition for the nurturing care and protection he provided for the infant Jesus and his mother in taking them to Egypt to escape Herod's slaughter of the innocents, and in rearing him as a faithful Jew at Nazareth.

The Gospel according to Matthew pictures Joseph as a man of deep devotion, open to mystical experiences, and as a man of compassion, who accepted his God-given responsibility with gentleness and humility. Joseph was a pious Jew, a descendant of David, and a carpenter by trade. As Joseph the Carpenter, he is considered the patron saint of the working man, one who not only worked with his hands, but taught his trade to Jesus. The little that is told of him is a testimony to the trust in God which values simple everyday duties, and gives an example of a loving husband and father.

Psalm for today: Psalm 89:1-4, 26-29

- 1 I will sing of your steadfast love, O Lord, for ever; with my mouth I will proclaim your faithfulness to all generations.

First Lesson: A Reading from 2 Samuel 7:4, 8-16

But that same night the word of the Lord came to Nathan: Now therefore thus you shall say to my servant David: Thus says the Lord of hosts: I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep to be prince over my people Israel; and I have been with you wherever you went, and have cut off all your enemies from before you; and I will make for you a great name, like the name of the great ones of the earth. And I will appoint a place for my people Israel and will plant them, so that they may live in their own place, and be disturbed no more; and evildoers shall afflict them no more, as formerly, from the time that I appointed judges over my people Israel; and I will give you rest from all

your enemies. Moreover, the Lord declares to you that the Lord will make you a house. When your days are fulfilled and you lie down with your ancestors, I will raise up your offspring after you, who shall come forth from your body, and I will establish his kingdom. He shall build a house for my name, and I will establish the throne of his kingdom for ever. I will be a father to him, and he shall be a son to me. When he commits iniquity, I will punish him with a rod such as mortals use, with blows inflicted by human beings. But I will not take my steadfast love from him, as I took it from Saul, whom I put away from before you. Your house and your kingdom shall be made sure for ever before me; your throne shall be established for ever.

Reader: The word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

Second Lesson: A Reading from Romans 4:13-18

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become 'the father of many nations', according to what was said, 'So numerous shall your descendants be.'

Reader: The word of the Lord. People: Thanks be to God.

Gospel Reading: Luke 2:41-52

Deacon: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke

People: Glory be to thee, O Lord

Now every year his parents went to Jerusalem for the festival of the Passover. And when he was twelve years old, they went up as usual for the festival. When the festival was ended and they started to return, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem, but his parents did not know it. Assuming that he was in the group of travelers, they went a day's journey. Then they started to look for him among their relatives and friends. When they did not find him, they returned to Jerusalem to search for him. After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. And all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers. When his parents saw him they were astonished; and his mother said to him, 'Child, why have you treated us like this? Look, your father and I have been searching for you in great anxiety.' He said to them, 'Why were you searching for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?' But they did not understand what he said to them. Then he went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them. His mother treasured all these things in her heart.

And Jesus increased in wisdom and in years, and in divine and human favor.

According to the <u>canonical Gospels</u>, **Joseph** (<u>Hebrew</u>: <u>romanized</u>: <u>Yosef</u>; <u>Greek</u>: Ἰωσήφ, <u>romanized</u>: <u>Ioséph</u>) was a 1st-century <u>Jewish</u> man of <u>Nazareth</u> who was <u>married</u> to <u>Mary</u>, the <u>mother of Jesus</u>, and was the legal father of <u>Jesus</u>.

Joseph is venerated as **Saint Joseph** in the <u>Catholic Church</u>, <u>Eastern Orthodox Church</u>, <u>Oriental Orthodox Church</u>, <u>Anglicanism</u> and <u>Lutheranism</u>. In Catholic traditions, Joseph is regarded as the <u>patron saint</u> of workers and is associated with various <u>feast days</u>. The month of March is dedicated to Saint Joseph. <u>Pope Pius IX</u> declared him to be both the patron and the protector of the Catholic Church, in addition to his patronages of the sick and of a holy death, due to the belief that he died in the presence of Jesus and Mary. Joseph has become patron of various <u>dioceses</u> and places. Being a patron saint of virgins, he is venerated as "most chaste". A specific veneration is attributed to the pure and most <u>Chaste Heart of Joseph</u>.

Several venerated images of Saint Joseph have been granted a decree of <u>canonical coronation</u> by a <u>pontiff</u>. Religious <u>iconography</u> often depicts him with <u>lilies</u> or <u>spikenard</u>. With the present -day growth of <u>Mariology</u>, the theological field of <u>Josephology</u> has also grown and since the 1950s centers for studying it have been formed. [7][8]

In the New Testament


The <u>Pauline epistles</u> are the oldest extant Christian writings. [9] These mention Jesus' mother (without naming her), but do not refer to his father. The <u>Gospel of Mark</u>, believed to be the first gospel to be written and with a date about two decades after <u>Paul</u>, also does not mention Jesus' father. [10]

The first appearance of Joseph is in the gospels of <u>Matthew</u> and <u>Luke</u>, often dated from around 80–90 AD. Each contains a <u>genealogy of Jesus</u> showing ancestry from King <u>David</u>, but through different sons; Matthew follows the major royal line from <u>Solomon</u>, while Luke traces another line back to <u>Nathan</u>, another son of David and <u>Bathsheba</u>. Consequently, all the names between David and Joseph are different.

Like the two differing genealogies, the infancy narratives appear only in Matthew and Luke and take different approaches to reconciling the requirement that the Messiah be born in Bethlehem with the tradition that Jesus in fact came from Nazareth. In Matthew, Joseph obeys the direction of an angel to marry Mary. Following the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem, Joseph is told by an angel in a dream to take the family to Egypt to escape the massacre of the children of Bethlehem planned by Herod, the ruler of the Roman province of Judea. Once Herod has died, an angel tells Joseph to return but to avoid Herod's son, and he takes his wife and the child to Nazareth in Galilee and settles there. Thus in Matthew, the infant Jesus, like Moses, is in peril from a cruel king, like Moses he has a (fore)father named Joseph who goes down to Egypt, like the Old Testament Joseph this Joseph has a father named Jacob, and both Josephs receive important dreams foretelling their future.

In the Gospel of Luke, Joseph already lives in Nazareth, and Jesus is born in Bethlehem because Joseph and Mary have to travel there to be counted in a census. Subsequently, Jesus was born there. Luke's account makes no mention of him being visited by angels (Mary and various others instead receive similar visitations), the Massacre of the Innocents, or of the flight into Egypt.
